Structure and Governance

The Charity is a Scottish Charitable Incorporated Organisation (SCIO) and was registered in its current legal form on 27 September 2017. The charity was an unincorporated association before changing its legal form to a SCIO. Its governing document is a Constitution, according to which the charity has a single tier structure and as such the trustees are the members of the charity.

Trustees must retire from office at Annual General Meeting but will be deemed to have been re-elected except under certain conditions. In addition, the board may at any time appoint any person to be a charity trustee by way of a resolution passed by majority vote at a board meeting. There must be a minimum of five and a maximum of eleven trustees.





Objectives and Activities

Charitable Purposes



Prewired's charitable purpose is to advance the education of young people and in furtherance of this:

- to encourage young people to become active participants in creatively using and building digital technologies;
- to provide a supportive environment in which young people can work collaboratively with their peers and with more experienced mentors to develop their digital skills and undertake individual and team projects; and
- to support mentors in building on their existing strengths and in acquiring new skills by working with young people, and to support them in demonstrating how they have developed personally and how they have made a positive impact.

Prewired is a programming club for young people under the age of 19 and is based in

Edinburgh. Participants attend weekly evening sessions where they improve their skills in digital technologies within a friendly, collaborative, and supportive environment. They

pursue a wide variety of projects, including web development, mobile applications, games and constructing robots and other hardware devices.

Prewired sets no lower bound on the age or experience of participants, as these do not help us to understand an individual's abilities or potential. The only requirement for attendance is enthusiasm about programming and a desire to learn. We think technology can help us move towards a better world, but only if future generations understand the opportunities it brings and the impact it can have.



Activities

At the beginning of 2021 Prewired was awarded funding from Creative Informatics' Resident Entrepreneur programme to support research into ways which could more effectively take Prewired online. We decided that as we were unable to provide our usual Prewired Summer Hackathon, we would instead run not one, not two - but three hackathons entirely online. These were very successful with an average attendance of ~9 attendees per 2-week-long "sprint". This was a significant increase from our initial attempts to take Prewired online in 2020. In October of 2021 a number of long-term Trustees stepped down and were succeeded by existing and new volunteers from partner organisations. The board welcomes fresh perspectives on Prewired's activities and hopes the previous Trustees are enjoying a well-earned rest.

In early 2022 we began preparing for our return to physical sessions. Following strict adherence to governmental social distancing guidance, Prewired was finally able to safely and slowly welcome attendees back in April 2022, with weekly sessions returning to a regular schedule.

Our measured return to physical sessions has allowed us to connect with old and new attendees, while also building up our network of supportive mentors and volunteers. Our increased social media presence has helped us grow our engaged online audience and a number of new partnership opportunities have arisen which will allow us to expand our workshop offerings as we move into 2023.

While we had initial difficulties obtaining PVG Disclosure certificates due to COVID-19 backlog, we are now regularly adding more volunteers to our mentor community and in September 2022 we ran our first training evening for our new cohort of mentors. We are also continuing to experiment with running occasional themed workshops (e.g. on battery choice, and on using different types of hardware, like Microbits) and plan to incorporate more workshops into our regular club schedule, specifically for our younger audiences who may need more guided tasks.



Financial Review

Since our activities continued to be suspended for the majority of the year, we have not incurred our usual running expenses. Our main expenditure has been our annual insurance renewal.

Policy on Reserves

Because of the suspension of our usual activities, we have not considered it necessary to maintain a specific level of reserves.
